This Honda-Powered Ferrari 308 Will Break Your Brain in the Best Way

Two years of dedicated, hands-on work result in one of the most talked about cars of SEMA 2022.



It's all about the build during the annual SEMA show. While the event was established in the 1960s to bring manufacturers, together distributors, retailers; all the way down to the small business mechanic, those of you reading this and other SEMA coverage pieces are looking for the latest and greatest vehicles. Choosing just the right one is key to brand recognition on the crowded convention center floor and CSF Radiators, a group that's been on a tear in recent years with jaw dropping booth displays, seem to have found the perfect formula once again.



It all started in 2015 when the Rywire Motorsport Electronics one-off Integra Type R, parked right next to his GT3, graced the CSF Radiator booth, and caused quite a commotion. Both cars carried similar looks and the Integra would go on to steal the spotlight for months afterward. There were others. CSF's Ravi Dolwani would later display his own Evo X racecar next to Sheepey Race's boosted Lambo. Then, in 2018 came the Honest Assembly E30 M3 that packed an S55 engine swap and one of the most thorough OEMplus builds we've ever encountered along with yet another Sheepey creation, this one sporting a prancing horse on its badging.

Last year, Dolwani put a stop to the dual car layout and instead filled the front of his company's display space with his own 911 SC. It featured a slew of builders that dwell in the upper echelon of automotive expertise and the finished product is living, driving proof of that. This year, the dual chassis set up was brought back and filled with this one-off Ferrari build powered by controversy and the Art of Attack x RS Future BMW M4 destined for the track next week.



If you're at all in tune with the automotive YouTube space, then chances are you either follow or have been exposed to the StanceWorks channel. It features the work of Mike Burroughs and includes everything from tearing cars and engines down to custom suspension work, tons fabrication, and everything in between. The episodes are informative and never feel like fluff just to get a video out and if you pay attention, you're likely to learn something interesting. Well known for his fully custom E28 5-Series dubbed "Rusty Slammington," Burroughs took a this different direction with latest creation.

What started as a nicely running and driving 1981 Ferrari 308 GTBi in Fly Yellow and with just 38,000 miles on the clock, was completely torn down and reworked in Burroughs' style as a Honda-powered lap chaser. Now, we've been here before, and Honda's 2.4-liter inline-four seems to be the go-to for a ton of projects, but a Ferrari? I've had this argument far too many times when talking about Amir Bentatou's turbo K20 time attack NSX, or car's like Jarvik

Mosley's <u>supercharged K24 NSX street</u> <u>car</u>, so I'll lay out the basic bullet points and you can choose to shake your fist in anger or nod your head in some sort of agreement.



The original Ferrari F106 engine is a 2.9-liter V-8 that makes around 202 hp at the crank, while the TSX's K24A2 makes about 205 hp. Did he really do all that work for a few horsepower? No, he did it because he had no intentions of leaving the K24 stock, as there's unmatched aftermarket support for it and the amount of money required to build out the native power plant is absolutely silly. Oh, and then there's the weight issue. Dropping four cylinders means a lighter vehicle, obviously, but it's not the 80 to 100 pounds you might be thinking of. Think more in the neighborhood of 400 pounds. Also, be sure to tack on the reliability factor, the accessories accessibility (try picking up a starter for a 308 GTBi at AutoZone), and of course, the cost. The forged goods and turbo components cost money, sure, but when your engine's starting price is a mere \$700, you've got some leftover cash to play with.

Mounted transversely and topped with a Skunk2 low-profile valve cover, the all-custom engine compartment layout is clean and concise with every component (many of them homemade) serving a designated purpose with no unwanted extras. With the built long block, the Garrett G42-1200, which hangs low off the scratch-built manifold, should be good for four-digit numbers to pass through the Quaife 5-speed sequential if he chooses.



Cooling duties are of course handled by CSF Radiators, some of which can be seen through a massive exit vent applied to the carbon fiber hood and a cooler hanging from a crossbar in the engine room. The headlight covers remain shut with Hella square-body lights mounted within the center of the front bumper, just above the custom splitter with massive, upturned end plates. Equally aggressive side diffusers were added, and all four fenders received substantial bulking with flares that give the thin 308 physique some much-needed muscle tone.



Rotiform worked with Burroughs to create his ideal wheel set up that fit perfectly over AP brakes, H&R Springs built coilovers to his provided specs, and everything around those pieces is entirely custom. The engine compartment, a point of disdain for Burroughs at Ferrari's lack of detail and finish work from the factory, was lambasted then sandblasted and painted at the StanceWorks shop, and later its outside given a bright white makeover by All City Wraps.



You're going to see much more on this build in the coming weeks as every media outlet wants to get a closer look at the all-custom Ferrari 244 GTK (and hey, thanks for not calling it the Honrarri, Ferr-onda, or something equally atrocious), we just hope there's enough

time in there for Burroughs to enjoy some much deserved wheel time behind his two-year journey with one of the most detailed builds we've ever seen displayed at SEMA week.

MODEL STUFF

About forty years ago, Monogram came out with a series of 1/24 scale muscle cars. These included a Boss 429 Mustang, a 1969 Dodge Super Bee, and a 1969 GTO Judge. There were others, but they're not coming to mind just yet. While they were all cool, the one that I was most interested in was the GTO Judge.

I painted it with Duplicolor dark green metallic to mimic Pontiac's Verdoro green, and I added the green Judge markings. The engine got the full treatment including wiring and plumbing. I even wired the hood mounted tach.

Brake lines were added and the allnew GT Radials were detailed with white lettering and then installed. And although I haven't seen it in decades, I still have it. Somewhere.

Recently, Revell has reissued this kit, (for the millionth time) and I thought it might be a good time to relive that excitement I felt nearly forty years ago and build another one.

This time the plan is to paint it

orange and use the corresponding
Judge markings. So, I bought the kit at
my favorite Hobby store and
to my surprise, the box lid says that
the kit only has sixty three parts.

Only sixty three! That's little more than a snap kit. The engine is very simple with the oil pan molded to the engine halves. The intake manifold serves as the top of the engine and the entire front suspension is one piece.

The tail lights are chrome as they are molded as part of the rear bumper. A very simple kit, indeed, perhaps the most disappointing part of this kit is that those beautiful Good Year GT Radials are gone and replaced with noname skinnies.

It's hard to believe that this kit was once state of the art, but I'm still looking forward to building it.

This idea came as a collaboration between FORD and MAZDA to build a Little Hot Rod Sports car like the Sunbeam Tiger, only crazier with a

bigg honking V8. The car is powered by a Boss 429 FORD V8, it has a full roll cage.
